Faculty Engagement in Internationalization:

Policies and Practices

As the drivers of teaching and research on campus, faculty play a critical role in higher education institutions' efforts to internationalize. However, data from colleges and universities participating in ACE's 2011 Mapping Internationalization on U.S. Campuses survey indicate that institutional support for faculty engagement in internationalization does not not always reflect this reality. Data below are for four-year institutions.


