





American Indians and Alaska Natives in Undergraduate Education

American Indian/Alaska Native (AI/AN) undergraduates are a diverse group in many ways, including the number of tribes they represent-566 federally recognized tribes across 35 states. National data help us understand degree aspirations and enrollment and financial aid trends that get lost in generalizations of the understudied AI/AN population that represents almost one percent of the national college student body.
